Finance: The NZ dollar was in free-fall as the week ended and who knows what will happen. World financial markets have collapsed and oil prices are being pushed down by a battle between Russia & Saudi over supply. Most borders are closed and international travel is restricted. Panic buying of basic essentials has been nuts!!!

Wool: All wool prices are easing. It is almost uneconomic to shear the sheep.

Beef, Sheep & Venison schedules: Sheep & beef schedules are steady for the coming week, however the venison prices are still falling. International trade is disrupted with the covid-19. Manufacturing beef (mince) is in high demand!!!

Dairy Prices: The g/DT was down 3.9% with WMP down 4.2% and SMP down 8.1%. The results were considered very good as the world trade struggles. Fonterra has announced it will not pay a dividend this year in spite of the very good half year results. Buffering against the trade disruption with covid-19.

The covid-19 dominates everything. Stock sales are still on and freezing works are still operating. The dairy factories are operational. The fruit picking will create some difficulties with transient staff. But we do have a responsibility to staff under the Health & Safety at Work Act 2015 to ensure staff are safe. Stay safe and don't panic!!

Most people struggle to conceptualize what 400 ppm actually represents. *The best way to get peoples attention is to show them what 400 ppm actually looks like. The CO₂ in the atmosphere is 400 ppm or 0.04%. Get 1.25 kg of rice on a tray, that should be 82,500 grains of rice. 400 ppm equates to 33 grains of rice, so move the 33 to one side away from the pile. The anthropogenic portion of the 33 grains equates to 1 grain, so move the 1 grain out from the 33 leaving 32 grains. Now try and explain how that 1 grain will change the remaining 82,467 grains in the big pile!!.*
